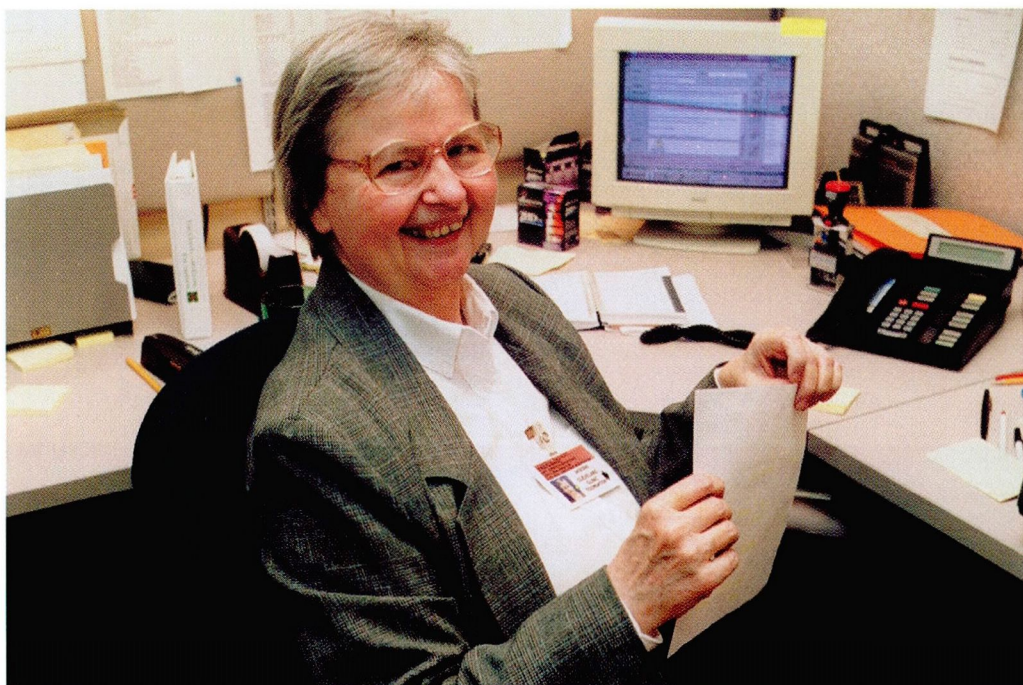




## Louisa Paskert, aide to five CCJM editors, to retire after 34 years
